Q: What's one thing about accounting that people might not be aware of?



Q: What do you see as the most pressing issues facing the profession? Facing CalCPA?

the Accounting Society and meeting other accounting students and professors had a great impact. Now I am going to sound old ... I only had two opportunities a year to take the CPA Exam. It was a manual exam with hundreds of others. I guess the upside

The first time I took the exam my new car was rear-ended by another person taking the exam. I looked in my rearview mirror and noticed he was studying notes while driving. At that instant I was hit. No one was injured. The cars were a little banged up. I


barely failed all four parts of that exam. At that point I told myself I was not going to keep wasting vacation time studying for the exam. I passed on the next attempt.

Q: What do you consider to be your greatest accomplishment or proudest moment as a CPA?
