ENGAGEMENT TO DATE

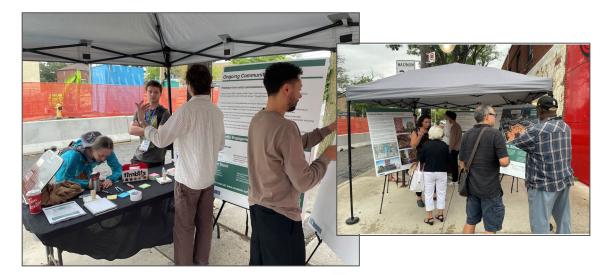
Consultation is important to City-initiated projects.

- ✓ July-August 2025: consultation with three community groups/institutions to introduce the project and get initial questions and reactions.
- ✓ August-September 2025: Two popups held at the Maria A. Shchuka Toronto Public Library and on site at 9 Shortt Street, to share information and answer questions about the development concept.
- ☐ Today: Community Meeting to share information, consider input and answer questions following the application submission for 9 Shortt Street.





WHAT WE'VE HEARD





- Support for affordable housing. Nearly everyone who stopped to talk said they are glad to hear more affordable housing is being planned.
- Community services and facilities need to grow with the population. Some participants said the area needs more community services and facilities and that the need is going to grow as more people come to the area.
- Some concern about the parking. A few participants shared some concern about the proposed parking allocation within the new development.
- Interest in engagement process, including receiving updates.





Housing TO Action Plan + Affordable Housing



Toronto is facing a **double housing crisis**:

- 1. A lack of deeply affordable and supportive housing for low-income marginalized and vulnerable residents.
- 2. Rising rental rates have made it increasingly unaffordable for middle income earners and key workers and professionals to live in the city.

- 10,000+ individuals experiencing active homelessness.
- Indigenous and Black residents overrepresented in homeless population.
- About 48% of Toronto households (557,970 households) are renters.
- Over 85,000 households currently on the centralized waiting list.







HousingTO 2020-2030 Action Plan

Maximizing public land for public benefits.

- This project is part of the HousingTO 2020-2030 Action Plan.
- Goal to accelerate the development of affordable housing on City-owned land.
- This project leverages a City-owned, transitoriented site, to create new affordable housing and public realm improvements.
- The project aims to deliver a mixed-income, mixed-use development, supporting a transitoriented and complete community.

Toronto Builds: A Policy Framework to Build More Affordable Rental Homes on Public Land

- Goal is to establish a consistent, city-wide approach to building affordable rental housing on City land
- Toronto Builds sites will deliver a range of new rental homes within mixedincome communities on City land
- Includes policies and targets related to affordability, unit mix, accessibility and partnerships





Program + Tenure

- Public retention of sites through long-term land leases
- Mix of affordable rental and market rental (target for 30% affordable housing)



Affordable Housing

Who are these affordable units for?

• Low-to-moderate-income households from within this community, across the City and outside of the City.

How do I apply?

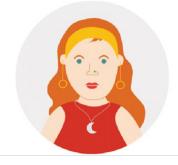
- The City will work with the future partner to undertake a fair & transparent application process for these affordable homes.
- A new hybrid model of allocating affordable rental homes will be launching and units will be allocated based on a centralized waiting list and a random draw process from new applicants.



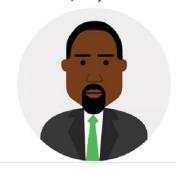

Affordable Housing

How many units will be affordable rental units?

 30% proposed units to be available at affordable rents.

What are the rents for the affordable units?

- City's new income-based definition
- Rents will be at or below the lesser of:
 - 1. Average Market Rent (by dwelling type); or
 - 2. 30% of before-tax household income (based on 50th or 60th percentile income).

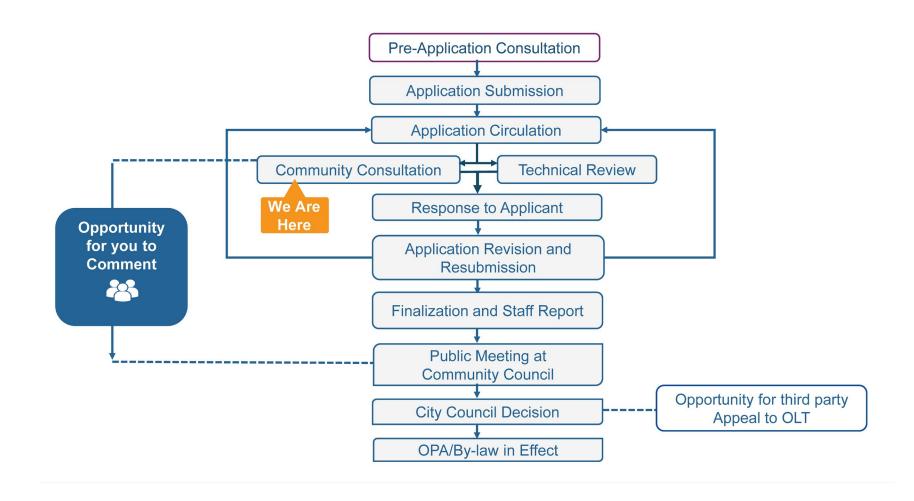

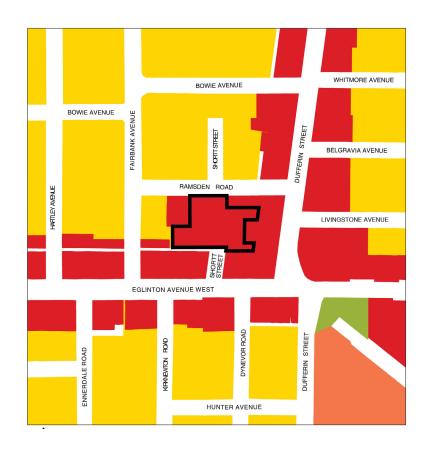

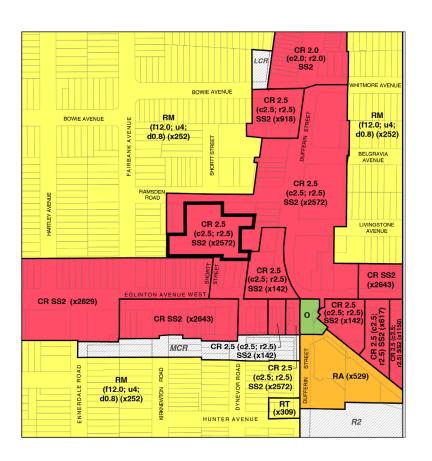






4.5 MIXED USE AREAS Mixed Use Areas achieve a multitude of planning objectives by combining a broad array of residential uses, offices, retail and services, institutions, entertainment, recreation and cultural activities, and parks and open spaces. Torontonians will be able to live, work, and shop in the same area, or even the same building, giving people an opportunity to depend less on their cars, and create districts along transit routes that are animated, attractive and safe at all hours of the day and night.

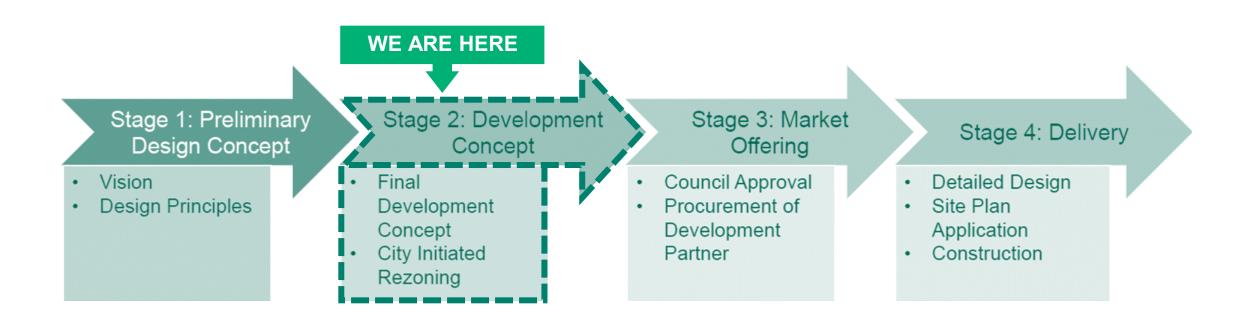
PROJECT OBJECTIVES

Toronto Builds Policy Objectives

- Mixed-income communities: support City-building objectives of creating mixed-income, complete communities with diverse housing types
- 2 Land: land will be retained in public ownership through 40 to 99-year leases
- 3 Tenure: 100% purpose-built rental
- 4 Affordable Housing: targeting 30% of residential units to be affordable rental housing
- Unit Mix and Sizes: minimum of 10% three-bedrooms and 35% two-bedrooms, and a maximum of 45% one-bedrooms and 10% studios
- Accessibility: 20% of new affordable rental homes, and 15% of market rental homes, must be accessible, meeting Ontario Building Code requirements for barrier-free
- 7 Sustainability: meet TGS Version 4, Tier 2

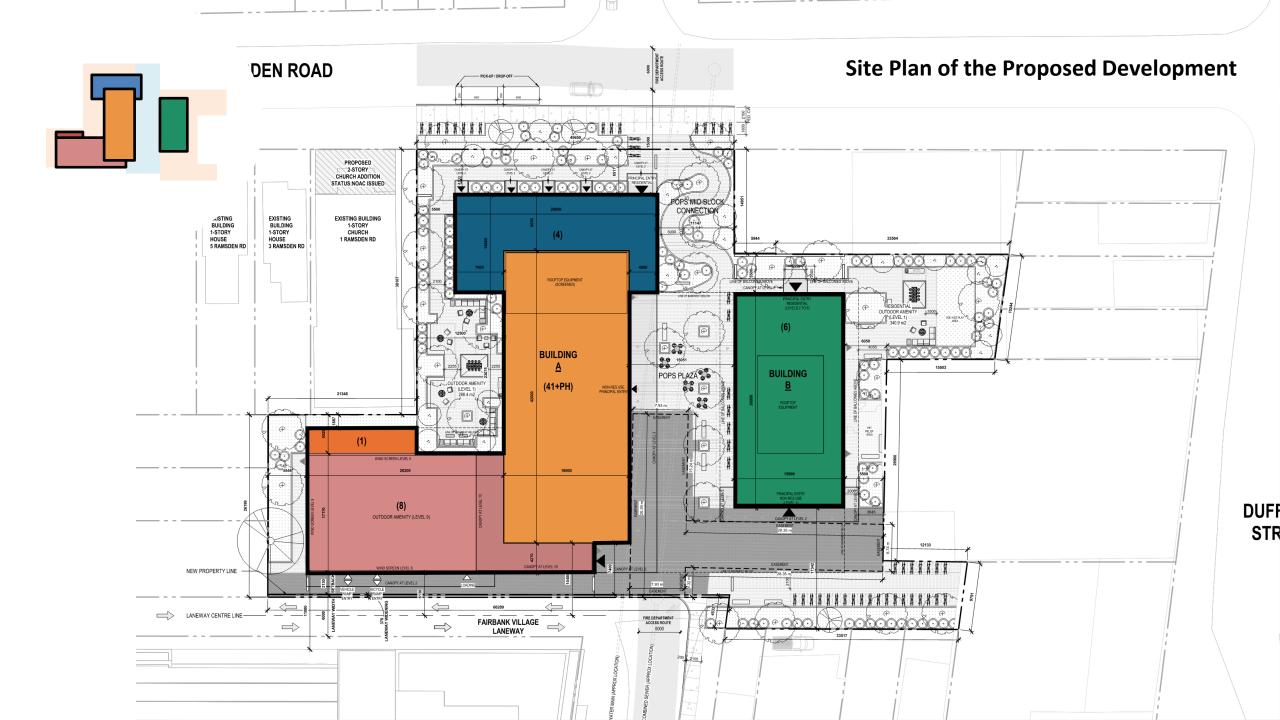


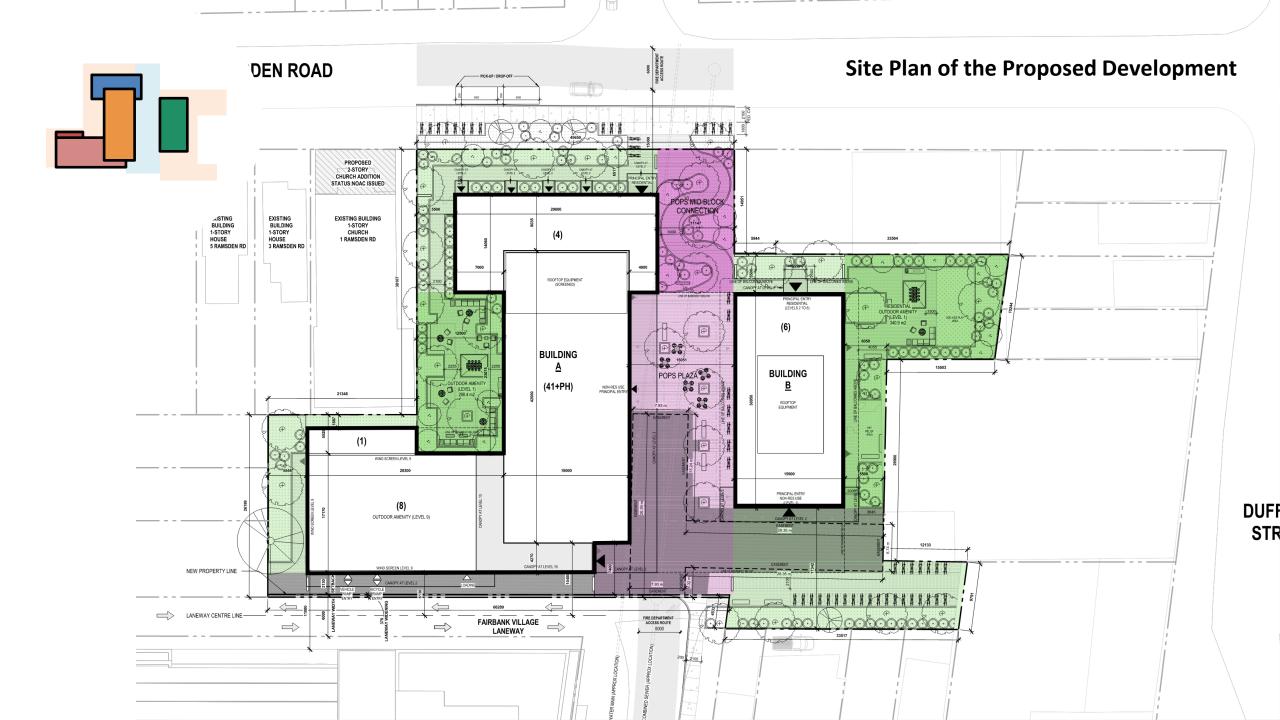


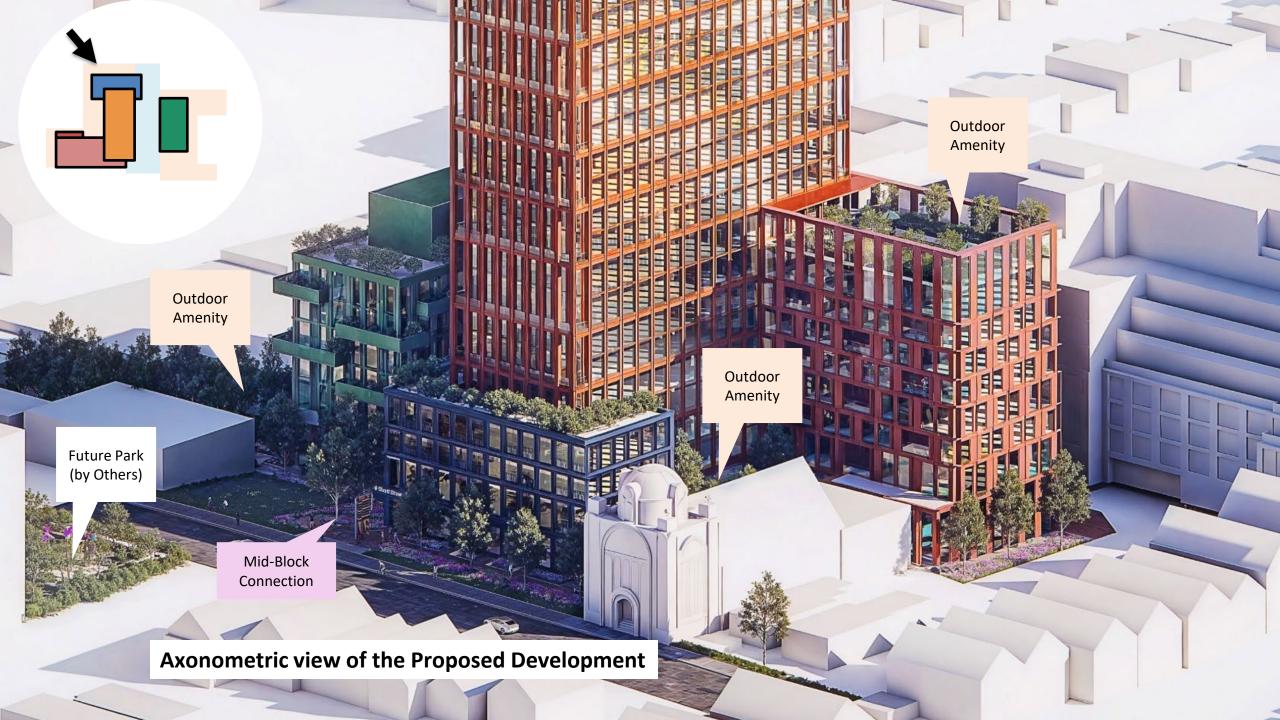






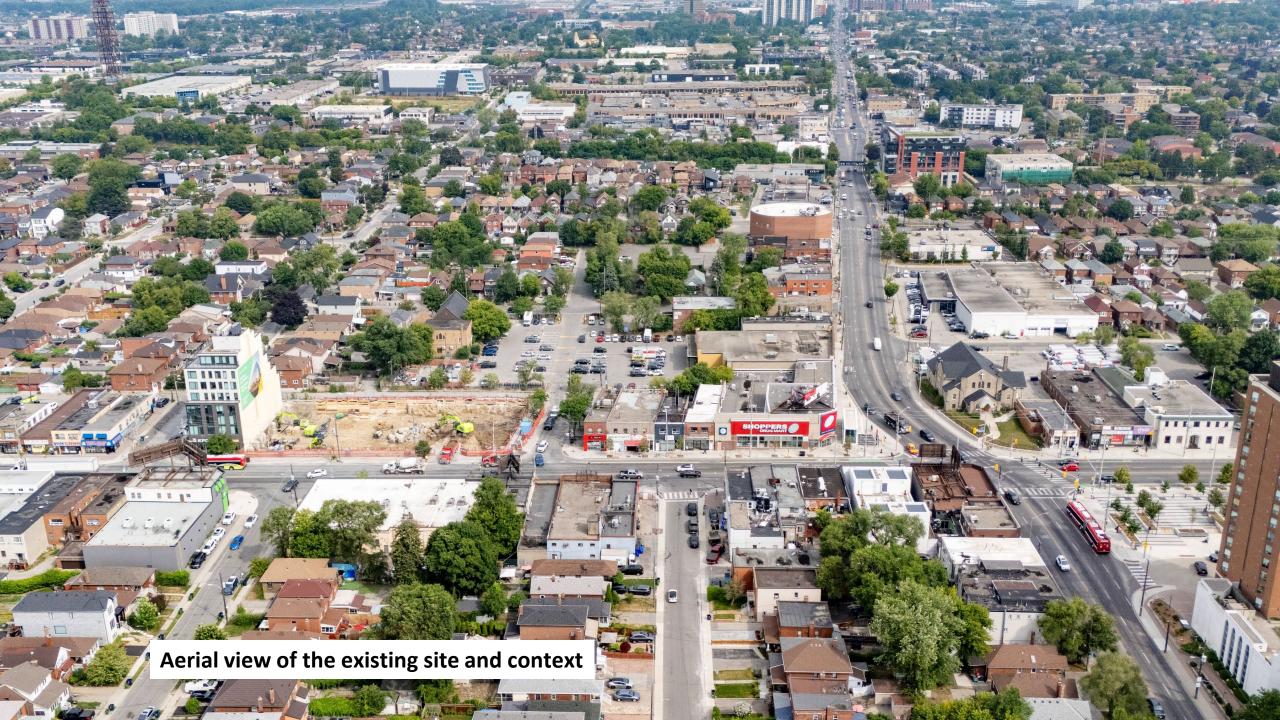






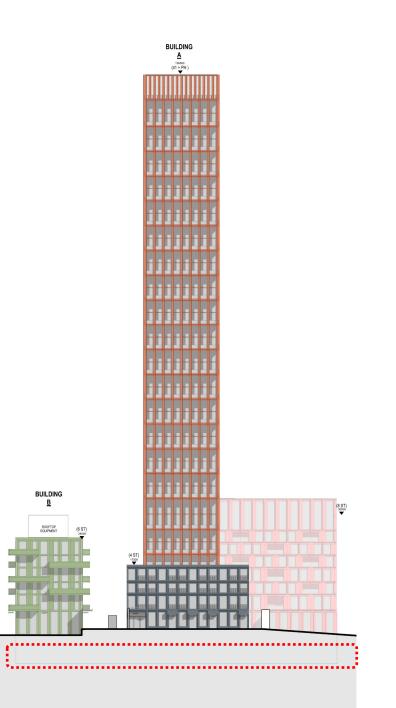




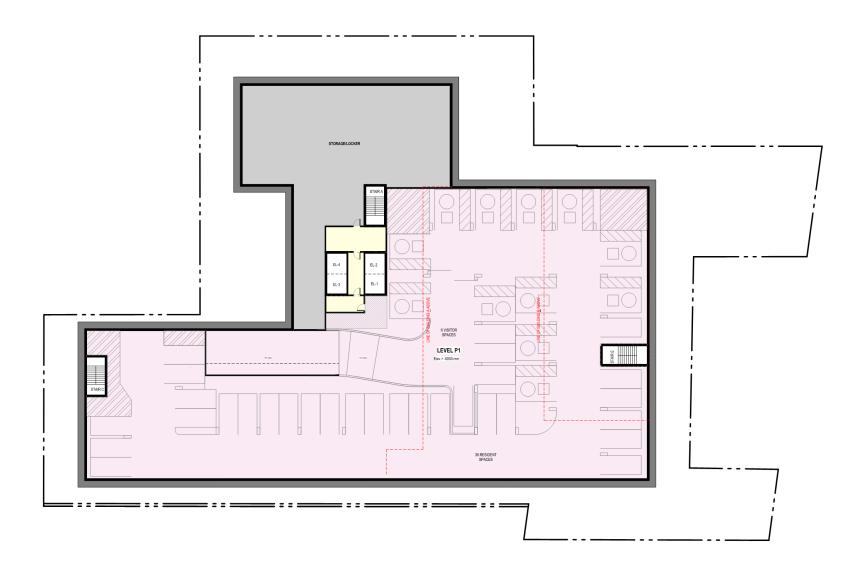






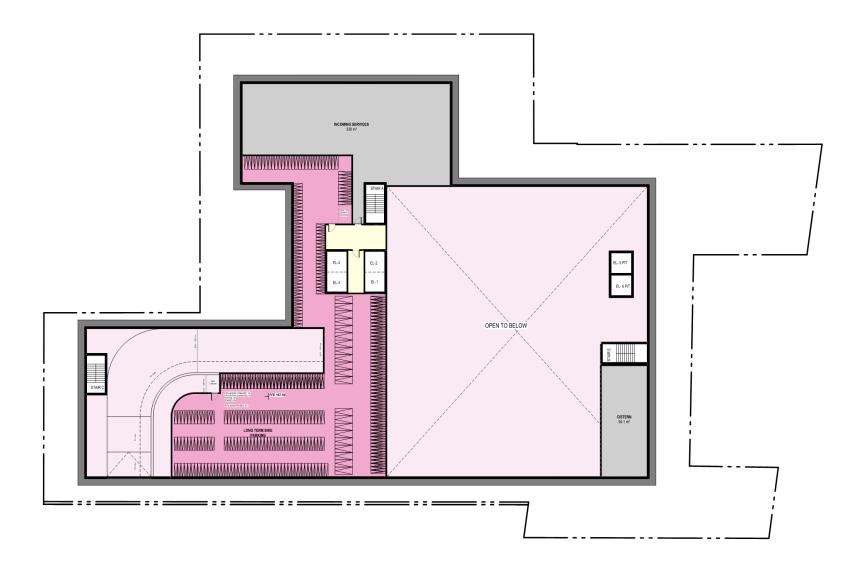


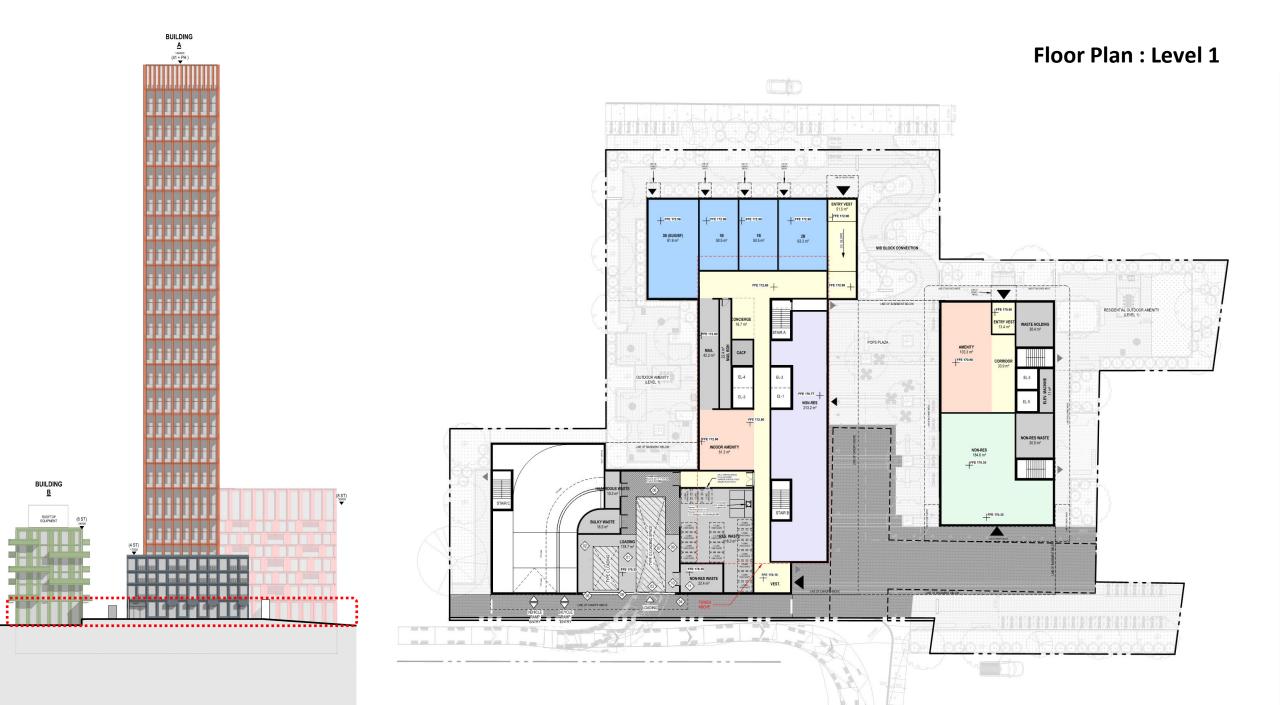
Floor Plan: Parking Level

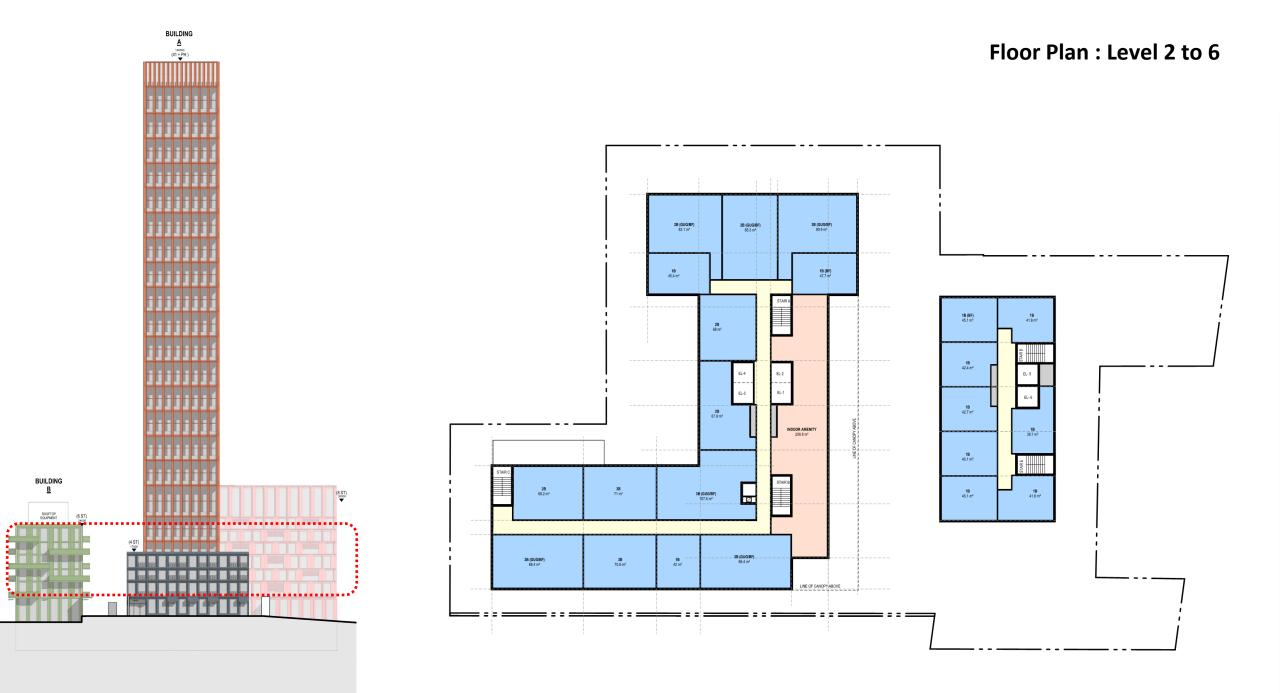


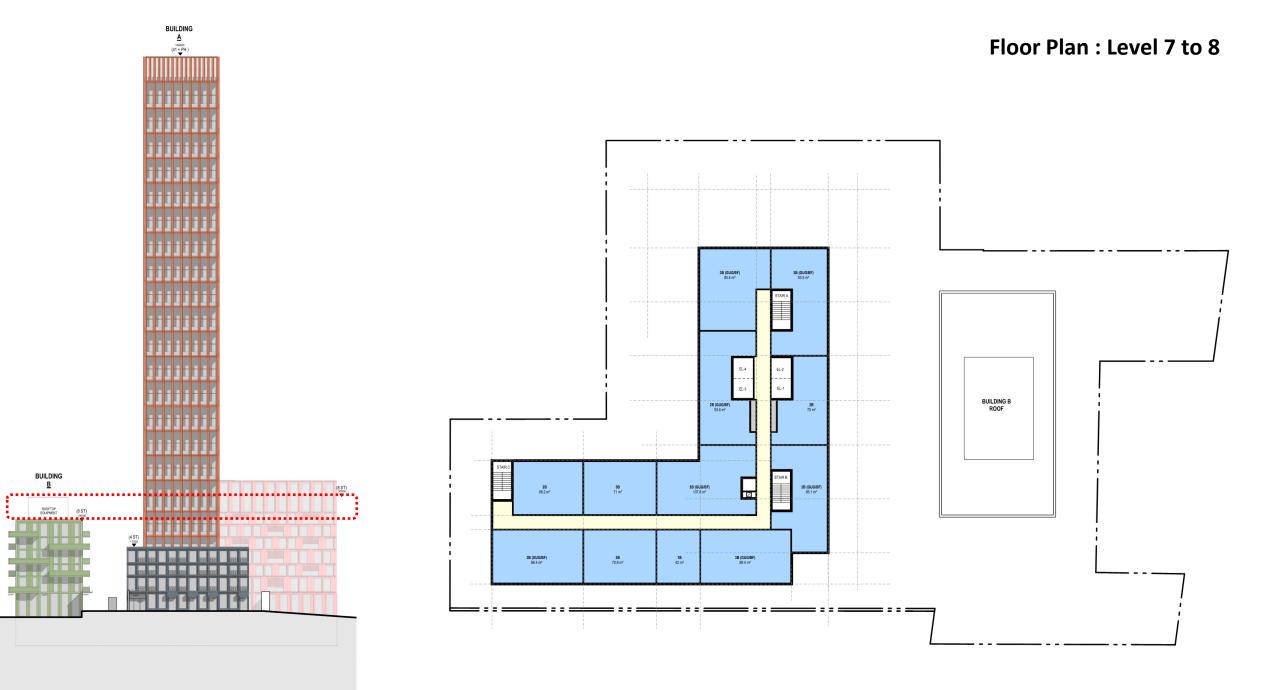

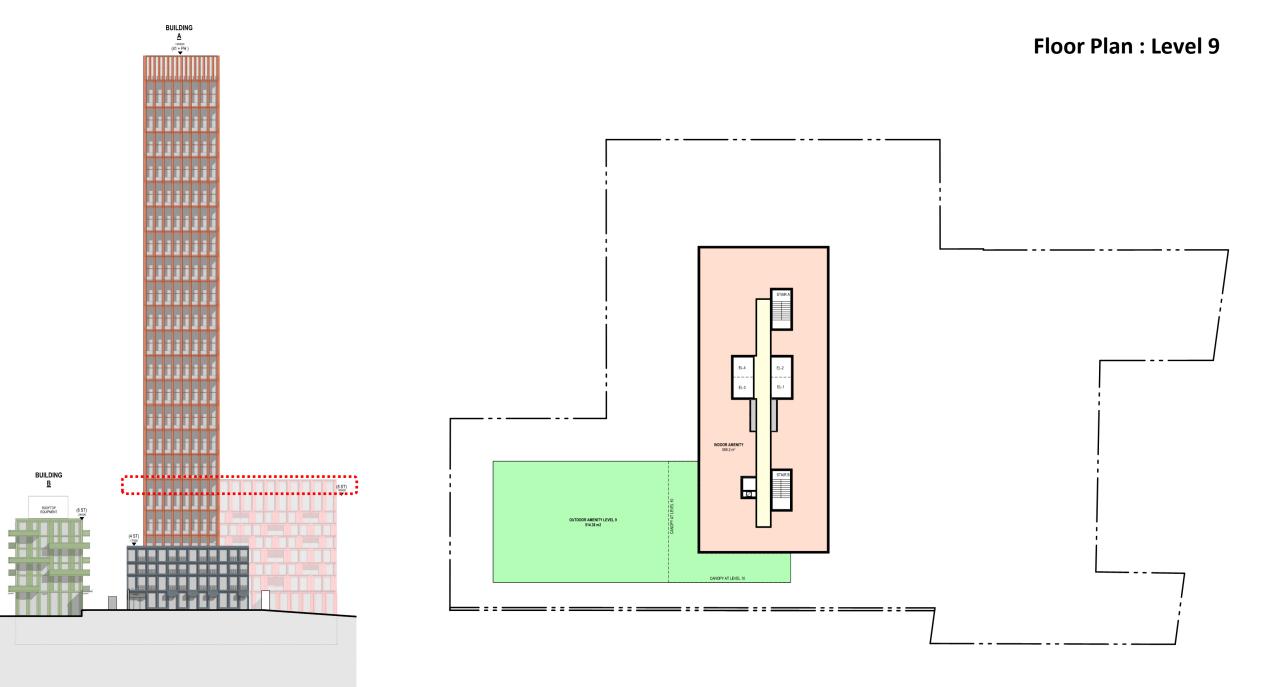
Floor Plan : Bike Mezzanine

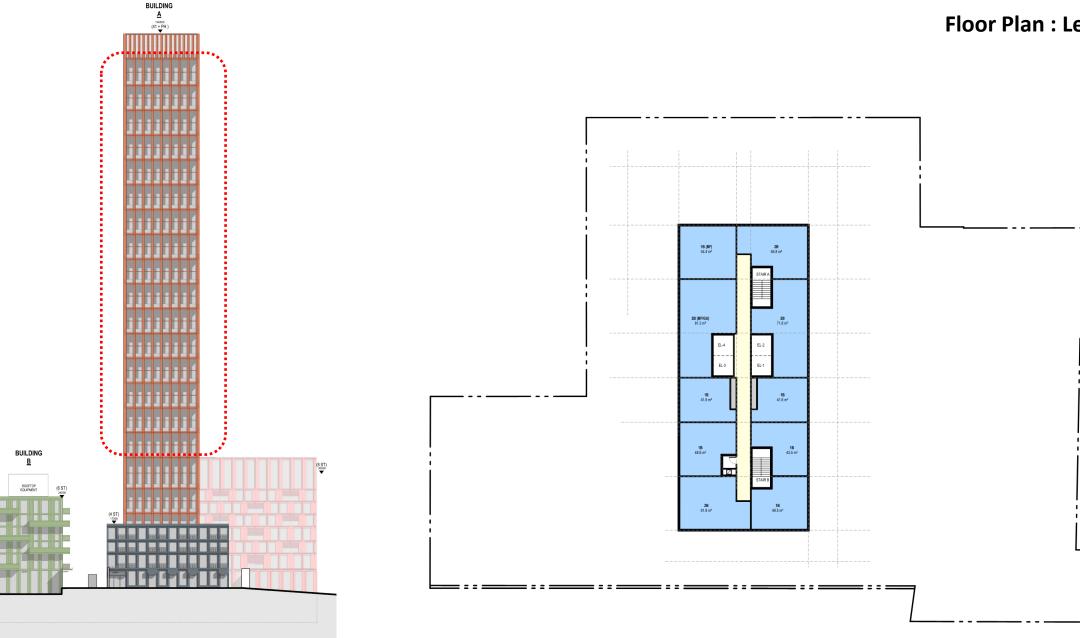












Floor Plan: Level 10 to 41
