Thunder on pace for historic season

The story of this Oklahoma City Thunder team is best told in numbers, and let's start with this one.

Late Tuesday night Dec. 2, with a 124-112 victory over the Golden State Warriors, the Thunder improved to 21-1, becoming the third team in NBA history to record such a start or better.

Entering the day, they led the NBA in defensive rating, allowing 103.6 points per 100 possessions ... which was 7.0 fewer than the next closest team.

Entering the night, they led the league with a net rating of 15.3.

Reigning MVP Shai Gilgeous-Alexander recorded his 94th consecutive 20-point game, trailing only Wilt Chamberlain (126). SGA ranks second in the league in scoring.

They are – far and away – the most dominant team in the NBA, with stars often resting in fourth quarters because games are so out of hand.

But it's one other number that Oklahoma City is chasing: 74.

Not only are the Thunder on pace to become the first team in 10 seasons to reach 70 wins, they pose a legitimate threat to eclipse the record-setting 73 the Warriors achieved in 2015-16. After all, a 70-win season would represent just a modest increase over last season, when they won 68.

To that point, OKC is already superbly locked in, its roster is balanced and deep, and coaches and players are almost obsessively nerdy about basketball.

When asked before Tuesday's game about how Oklahoma City could improve even with their near-unblemished record, coach Mark Daigneault made it clear the Thunder would not settle.

"I think the first thing is – and this isn't blowing smoke – it's like none of that matters tonight," Daigneault said of his team's early success. "All the stuff that we've done well to this point doesn't carry over. Tonight's a new opportunity. The better team tonight will win. That's the competitive challenge, and that's one of the beauties of our players: that competitive challenge turns them on."

Jalen Williams, 24, was a first-time All-Star last season. Recovering from a torn ligament in his right wrist, he missed the first 19 games this season. Williams is a righty. Unable to shoot with his right hand over the offseason, he became so bored and frustrated that he worked exclusively on his left, even developing an off-hand jumper.

But the Thunder are also built to

smother and overwhelm opponents. They pick up full-court pressure just as easily as they clamp down in half-court sets. They emphasize efficiency, ranking second in turnover percentage (12.4%) and first in turnovers forced (17.9 per game). They don't score in runs or bursts; they score in avalanches that squeeze the life out of opponents.

Tuesday night, the Warriors went on a third-quarter run to close the margin from 22, eventually taking a four-point lead in the fourth (103-99). Oklahoma City responded by not pressing and ripping off a 25-9 run to close the game.

Granted, the Thunder have played the NBA's easiest schedule thus far and have the league's toughest remaining slate, so it won't be an easy path. Oklahoma City will have to evade the pitfalls of complacency.

Their lone loss was an aberration, a two-point defeat on Nov. 5 against the Portland Trail Blazers. For the Thunder to make history, they will not be able to let up.

Tuesday night's opposing coach, Steve Kerr, knows all about that. He orchestrated that 2015-16 team's run to 73 wins, surpassing the 1995-96 Bulls – a team in which Kerr was a player.

"Overall a team mindset of zero agendas," Kerr said prior to the game when asked what it takes to get to 70 victories. "Just win every night. Obviously great talent, but I think high-IQ players. The two teams you're referring to that I was part of, both had really, really high IQs individually and as a team. That's what I see with OKC: really, really smart players, great coach, really connected. They're on pace to shatter the record; it's pretty remarkable what they're doing."

The scary part – for the rest of the NBA, that is – is that the Thunder are the sixth-youngest team in the league, with an average age of 24.53 entering the season. They are coming off an NBA championship; they know what it takes to get there and know how they can get even better.

"They have a deeper level of confidence now that they've won it all," Kerr said. "Then the continuity is so powerful. All their actions that they're running, they're so comfortable with. They've expanded their offense a little bit; they have a little more motion than they did a year ago."

The wild card, however, is that the more the Thunder win, the greater the pressure intensifies.

"These are all things that, in my experience, happen after the championship, after the first one," Kerr said. "You just got a little different swagger, a little different belief. But, yeah, next year is the harder one."

Steelers waive six-time Pro Bowl selection

The Pittsburgh Steelers are moving on from one of their veteran free agent acquisitions from this past offseason to make room for a more recent addition.

The team is waiving cornerback Darius Slay Jr. and promoting Asante Samuel Jr. from the practice squad, according to multiple reports.

Slay, 34, signed a one-year, \$10 million deal with the Steelers this offseason, with the team envisioning that he would hold down the starting spot opposite Joey Porter Jr. The six-time Pro Bowl selection started nine games but largely struggled, surrendering a 103.7 passer rating when targeted this season, according to Next Gen Stats.

In the Steelers' loss to the Buffalo Bills on Sunday Nov. 30, Slay was a healthy scratch, with Samuel playing 28 snaps after being elevated from the practice squad.

Samuel signed with the Steelers in mid-November after undergoing a spinal fusion procedure this offseason. The 26-year-old had remained unsigned

throughout the early portion of the season and not played since a shoulder injury ended his 2024 campaign with the Los Angeles Chargers after just four games.

Pittsburgh, which has dropped three of its last four games, will face the Baltimore Ravens on Sunday Dec. 7 for the AFC North lead.

Steelers claim WR Thielen off waivers

The Steelers continued to reshape their roster Tuesday by claiming two-time Pro Bowl wide receiver Adam Thielen off waivers.

Thielen was granted a split by the Minnesota Vikings on Monday so that he could play for a playoff contender in his final pro season. In Minnesota, he served in a limited capacity after helping fill in during Jordan Addison's three-game suspension to start the season.

Thielen joins a Steelers offense in need of help in the receiving corps. Beyond DK Metcalf, no pass catcher has more than 300 yards this season.

Clippers abruptly cut ties with veteran Chris Paul

The Los Angeles Clippers abruptly cut ties with veteran point guard Chris Paul in a stunning late-night move, releasing the 12-time All-Star in the middle of the team's current road trip.

Paul made the news public on Wednesday Dec. 3 in a post to his Instagram stories account: "Just Found Out I'm Being Sent Home," he wrote, adding a peace sign emoji.

If no other team picks him up, it would be an unexpected end to what Paul, 40, had announced would be his 21st and final NBA season.

The 5-16 Clippers suffered a blow-out loss to the Miami Heat on Monday Dec. 1, and were in Atlanta for a game Wednesday night against the Hawks.

After playing all 82 games last season for the San Antonio Spurs, Paul signed a free agent deal with the Clippers this season.

He had been playing only 14 minutes per game coming off the bench, averaging a career-low 2.9 points and 3.3 assists.

The Clippers later released a state-

ment from team president Lawrence Frank confirming the decision.

"Chris is a legendary Clipper who has had a historic career," the statement read in part. "I want to make one thing very clear. No one is blaming Chris for our underperformance. I accept responsibility for the record we have right now. There are a lot of reasons why we've struggled. We're grateful for the impact Chris has made on the franchise."

After being selected by the New Orleans Hornets with the fourth overall pick in the 2005 NBA draft and winning rookie of the year honors, Paul was traded to the Clippers in December 2011. He spent six seasons with them and was named to five All-Star teams before being traded to Houston at the end of the 2016-17 season.

In all, Paul has played for seven teams, returning to the Clippers for his 21st season.

He ranks second to John Stockton on the all-time NBA assists list with 12,552 and second in steals with 2,728. He also ranks 36th in career scoring with 23,058 points. He also is a two-time Olympic gold medalist with Team USA at Beijing in 2008 and London in 2012.

Another lost season could test Falcons' patience

Poor Raheem Morris. After waiting 13 years to finally get another crack at an NFL head coaching gig in 2024, his Atlanta Falcons were just (officially) eliminated from the playoff picture with a blowout loss last weekend.

And that seat is seemingly getting so warm.

Under Morris' watch, the Falcons (4-9) have lost seven of their past eight games to clinch the franchise's eighth consecutive losing season. No, given the stumbles of predecessors Arthur Smith and Dan Quinn, not all eight of those sub-.500 campaigns contained Morris' fingerprints. Yet he was hired to buck the trend and is failing miserably.

The offense, even when at full strength, has seriously underachieved. The special teams are much worse, with "Bad News Bears" tendencies. The defense is improved, yet is far from being confused for a championship unit.

The status quo will not cut it. Changes are surely coming.

Morris knows. As a Thursday night prime-time matchup at Tampa looms (Amazon Prime, 8:15 ET), speculation about his future has intensified.

"For me, that's the price of doing business," Morris told reporters this week at Falcons headquarters. "You don't put yourself in these positions to worry about those things. As a leader, you've got to stand up in front of people and answer the hard questions. You also get to stand up and be the good example for your guys and how you finish things."

It's that time of year. With the holidays come a lot of hollering about coaches' jobs. Just imagine how the Falcons' free fall might be wearing on the patience of team owner Arthur Blank, going on eight years since his franchise won its last playoff game on Jan. 6, 2018.

Blow it up again? Start over again? As tempted as he might be, and as loud as the Falcoholics might get (some internet sage insists the term derives from the Falcons driving their fans to drink), Blank should give this a bit more time. And not because of another dead-money situation. After the exhaustive search (that passed on Bill Belichick) led Blank to roll with Morris, there's something to be said for sticking to his conviction.

Patience is wearing thin in Atlanta, but it's what Falcons need

Look at how patience worked for a couple of other coaches who are now

regarded among the best in the NFL. Dan Campbell was 12-21-1 over his first two seasons with the Detroit Lions; Kyle Shanahan was 10-22 in his first two years with the San Francisco 49ers.

Sure, this was the year (like last year) the Falcons were supposed to compete for the NFC South title that has been owned by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers for the past four seasons. Remember, last season the Falcons swept the Bucs and beat the eventual Super Bowl champion Philadelphia Eagles, too. Had they managed the clock better in a couple of losses, they might have been in the playoffs.

Nonetheless, there was some spark and a promising young quarterback in Michael Penix Jr. (whose season ended last month with a torn ACL), to go with wonder-back Bijan Robinson and talented pass catchers Drake London, Darnell Mooney and Kyle Pitts.

What next? Blank hasn't commented publicly about his coach's status or the team's current crisis, which also fuels criticism of general manager Terry Fontenot. Although Fontenot, in the fifth year of a six-year contract, has assembled some premium talent with high picks since becoming GM in 2020 – which includes James Pearce, drafted in April with the 2026 first-round pick traded to the Los Angeles Rams – notable misses include defensive back Richie Grant and linebacker Trey Anderson, second-round picks in 2021 and 2022, respectively. And the massive deal to lure Kirk Cousins (four years, \$180 million), while coming off a torn Achilles, will haunt the Falcons' salary cap for two more years.

As usual, Blank was in the room as Morris addressed the media following the 37-9 shellacking from the Seattle Seahawks on Dec. 7. When Morris finished his press conference, he briefly mingled with Blank and some of the owner's family members. As Blank left the stadium, he waved and greeted media members – yet unlike the approachable vibe he used to flow with, did not stop for questions – as he was escorted away by security personnel.

If Blank was embarrassed, it is understated. One football move after another has yet to pan out.

Yet Morris, who meets with Blank weekly on Mondays, was upbeat when asked about the support from the team's owner.

"He is 100% in support of me," Morris maintained. "Support is not an issue. He is absolutely outstanding. His ability to listen. His ability to be there for us, his ability to be in it with us, is absolutely 100% awesome."

Staff changes are almost certain; the questions are where and how many

Time will tell whether Morris can continue to bank on that support.

If he stays, the pressure on Morris will ramp up to find an offensive coordinator to bring out the best in the talent. Zac Robinson, who came off the Sean McVay tree but never called plays until landing with the Falcons last year, has been married to the pistol formation – and without mobile quarterbacks. And Atlanta, second-worst in the NFL for third-down conversion rate (31%),

has scored the sixth-fewest points in the league (252) while averaging 19.4 points per game.

After last season, Morris replaced defensive coordinator Jimmy Lake with Jeff Ulbrich. That's worked out. Bolstered by a better pass rush that includes first-round edge rushers Jalon Walker and Pearce, the 14th-ranked defense has a lot more teeth. Atlanta ranks third in the NFL with 43 sacks, on pace to threaten the franchise record (55) set over 16 games in 1997.

Meanwhile, special teams coordinator Marquise Williams is undoubtedly on the hot seat, too. Last weekend, Seattle took control of the game when Rashid Shaheed returned the second-half kickoff 100 yards for a touchdown. The Falcons had a field goal attempt blocked, too. And it all represented more misery for the unit that has cycled through three kickers this season and is last in the league for kick-return average. A week earlier, the close loss at the New York Jets was stamped by key special teams gaffes (an 83-yard kickoff return allowed and a muffed punt) that led to 10 points.

After the game in New York, Morris, who earlier this season fired receivers coach Ike Hilliard, bristled when asked about the job security of his special teams coach.

Yet the questions aren't going away. "Staff changes right now are irrelevant," Morris said. "You always want to go across and evaluate everything at the end of the season."

It must be tough being a Falcons fan. And 28-3 was just one Super Bowl 51 reflection of the heartbreak.

The current meter is running at 6-15 since starting 6-3 in Morris' first nine games at the helm last season. Rather than playing for the division title, the Falcons head into the Thursday night prime-time game playing to save face and perhaps jobs.

After last weekend's loss, Morris came with a one-game-at-a-time response when I asked whether he had a message for the long-suffering base of supporters stomaching another losing season.

"Our fan base deserves a winner," Morris said. "The only thing we can do is try to find a way to go win in this Thursday night game. You can't make any promises you can't keep at this moment. All you can do is give them the best effort you can give them, potentially on Thursday night."

That effort and the attached results have hardly been good enough lately, which is exactly why the Falcons are flying into a storm of speculation. Or worse.

Paul 'at peace' with Clippers' decision, next move

There is one silver lining to the abrupt end to Chris Paul's brief return to the Los Angeles Clippers. He'll finally get to watch his son play in a basketball game this week.

Watching his family enjoy the game, Paul revealed to People magazine in a new interview, is why he's "at peace" with the Clippers' stunning decision to send the 12-time NBA All-Star home from the team in the middle of the night during a road trip in Atlanta. But the 40-year-old point guard is taking a wait-and-see approach in regards to potentially resuming what had previously been announced as his final NBA season.

"Stuff's been a little crazy in the past few days – to say the least," Paul said in a story published on Tuesday Dec. 9. "But honestly, I'm home. My daughter had tryouts yesterday. My nephew had a basketball game. My son has a game coming up on (Dec. 12).

"I have never seen my son play a game in person," he added. "Not a middle school game, not a high school game. So I'm excited about seeing him play."


What he said about the drama involving Los Angeles

Paul signed with the Clippers this off-season after indicating he wanted to play the 2025-26 season in Los Angeles to be close to his family for the first time since he was initially traded away from the franchise in 2017. He then announced last month he planned to retire after this NBA season.

But Paul wound up making his final appearance for the Clippers on Dec. 1. His return lasted just 16 games and he was averaging career lows in minutes, points and assists while shooting a career-worst 32.1% from the field this season.

The move to part ways with Paul, as well as how the Clippers handled delivering the news to the 21-year veteran, caused a stir throughout the league because of his stature in the sport. Paul sent out an Instagram post around 3 a.m. ET on Dec. 3 to announce he was being sent home by the team. Paul also spent six years with the franchise from 2011 to 2017, reaching the All-Star Game in each of those seasons. He is the Clippers' all-time leader in assists (4,076).

"I don't regret anything," Paul said. "I was in Atlanta with a whole bunch of

family. It was my last time gonna be playing there. That's life. The whole thing took on a life of its own, you know? But I'm excited to be back here with my family."

Clippers coach Tyrone Lue subsequently told reporters Paul "wasn't a good fit" after multiple reports emerged detailing how Paul's leadership style

clashed with both Lue and other players in the Los Angeles locker room.

But Clippers star James Harden expressed confusion and surprise at the separation between Paul and the team, while Kawhi Leonard called the front office's move "shocking."

What's next for Paul, Clippers?

The Clippers (6-18) have been perhaps the NBA's most disappointing team this season compared to preseason expectations, though the franchise noted in its decision to part ways with Paul that it did not blame him for those struggles.

The team has yet to waive, trade or buy out Paul's one-year, \$3.6 million contract.

Clippers general manager Lawrence Frank said in a statement the team would "work with (Paul) on the next step of his career." If released by the Clippers, Paul wouldn't be eligible to sign with another team until Dec. 15.

"I'm actually at peace with everything," Paul said in regards to his immediate future. "More than anything, I'm excited about being around and getting a chance to play a small role in whatever anything looks like next."
