PRTC began 20 years ago as a premier training arena for first responders and counter-terrorism programs and has expanded its capabilities for military, homeland security, law enforcement, and research entities. Through its expanded mission, PRTC has an academically led, responsive research and training environment with the goal of replicating combat conditions and performing simultaneous operations to support multi-service, joint, and coalition Information Dominance. While leaning on stakeholders, PRTC is continuing to build a reconfigurable, responsive foundation of spectrum, security, connectivity, open-air networks, and a power & fiber backbone.



The motto at PRTC is "It's not Playas OR, It is Playas AND." PRTC offers what many cannot. Over the last two decades, PRTC has invested in infrastructure and assets that make it an ideal test-bed for research, experimentation, and training. This facility is additive and complementary for other facilities, research, and training experiences.



In addition to our world-class academic research, New Mexico Tech has more than a dozen research centers and institutes that work with private industry, government agencies and other universities. These divisions employ undergraduate students, offer research opportunities for graduate students and contribute ground-breaking research to the scientific canon and the world of industry, science and engineering.

RED FLAG-RESCUE

The Playas facility is designed to accommodate a wide range of military and security exercises. Whether for search and rescue, high-value target tracking, or flag-level exercise support, the environment offers comprehensive support. Red Flag-Rescue is the Department of Defense's premier combat search and rescue (CSAR) exercise, hosted by Davis-Monthan Air Force Base at PRTC. It involves other service branches, as well as partner nations and is roughly two weeks long. Whether it is a mass casualty or a downed pilot rescue, the participants of RF-R utilize the skills learned from their respective training pipeline and sharpen them through repetition so that if the need arises to utilize CSAR there is no room for doubt. The exercise provides advanced, realistic and relevant air-to-surface integration warfighter training in a robust, and operationally limited, environment. Whether the US military is providing humanitarian aid during a natural disaster, or proving combat power in a conflict, learning how to execute CSAR missions in a joint-service environment will drastically improve mission success rates.
