UPDATED RESOLUTIONS AFTER DAY TWO

ENERGY

The United States federal government should establish a domestic renewable energy policy, including a market-based instrument.

CORPORATE CONTROL

The United States federal government should substantially expand the scope of antitrust liability.

FOOD INTEGRITY

The United States federal government should substantially increase its regulation of food integrity in the United States.

EXECUTIVE POWER

The United States federal government should substantially increase judicial and/or statutory restrictions on the powers of the President in one or more of the following: immigration, military deployment, sanctions, tariffs.

FOOD SUBSIDIES

The United States federal government should substantially decrease its domestic agricultural subsidies.

CARBON PRICING

The United States federal government should adopt a domestic climate policy including a carbon pricing instrument.

LABOR

The United States federal government should substantially strengthen labor law for workers in the areas of organizing and/or collective bargaining.

VOTING AND ELECTION REFORM

The United States federal government should overturn one or more of the following Supreme Court decisions: Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission, McCutcheon, et al. v. Federal Election Commission, Rucho v. Common Cause, Shelby County v. Holder.

HEALTH INSURANCE

The United States federal government should establish national health insurance in the United States.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE PREPAREDNESS

The United States federal government should substantially increase its public health emergency preparedness for infectious diseases in the United States.

MASS TRANSIT

The United States federal government should substantially expand access to one or more of the following passenger transportation systems in the United States: buses, commuter rail, light rail, high-speed rail, subways, trolleys, ferries, aviation.

NUCLEAR WEAPONS

The United States federal government should substantially reduce the size and/or restrict the roles of its nuclear weapons arsenal.
